Greetings WAC community! I'm excited to share with you some of the work that's been happening to take us forward to a new location. Our executive director, Lisa Joyce, has shared some information, but I thought it would be helpful to offer some more

Our wonderful search committee (which includes an accomplished local real estate agent) have been hard at work scouring Salem for a facility that will suit our needs. The committee has developed a list of our needs (www.willametteartcenter.com/ wac-move-fags/) and has looked through dozens of listings. Many of the listings they viewed were quickly eliminated due to inadequate parking or were financially out of reach. Members of the committee have toured seven facilities in person and we have some very good leads. But, the Salem area is a tight market and we're competing with others looking for space.

This brings me to the next part of this message: fundraising. The very best way for us to get into a facility, retain our amazing staff and get things up and running is to raise enough money. Our goal is \$200,000. To be honest, when I became the Board President, I didn't know I was going to have to ask you to donate. It's not something that's been part of the WAC culture and honestly, it's outside my comfort zone. This community has been a refuge and a light for so many people, so I hope you'll consider a gift to WAC. We're also looking for sponsors and major donors. BUILDING OUR DONOR CULTURE FOR A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

Since launching the **Reshape Our Community Studio** campaign we've raised \$14,000. This is a win and you should be proud of the connections and work all are doing to support WAC. We have a long way to go! Keep up the positivity.

For any non-profit to thrive, it needs consistent and reliable funding. Think of funding as a stool with legs, at least three, that support the seating surface. If one leg is longer than the others, the stool is liable to fall over. If three legs are fairly even in length, the stool won't tip.

Relying on multiple funding sources allows a nonprofit to create a sustainable model where the nonprofit can focus on its mission and plan for the future with confidence.

For the WAC, grants, classes, and firing tickets have been the only funding sources. That coupled with generous lease terms, have allowed the WAC to thrive. In this new era, we need to adjust our considerations of funding. We need to identify the other legs of the stool and work to fill them.


One of the best ways to fill another leg, is to build our donor culture. Other legs (more than three is ideal) must also match income goals so that long term goals can be planned and achieved.

AMANDA OHRN'S GLAZING TIPS

Another mug! The body was dipped in Red Dawn, and then the inside and rim were dipped in Stoney Yellow. Some really interesting crystallization happened at the overlap. It looks a bit like ice crystals!



A textured mug glazed in Red Dawn and Magic Mushroom.
First, the body of the mug was dipped in Red Dawn, and then the inside and rim were dipped in Magic



1/8" overlap of the glazes. I'm intrigued by the purple color on the overlap and will be experimenting further!

A goofy-shaped little darted mug! It got a full dip in Tomato followed by a dip on the rim in The Beekeeper.

Mushroom, with about



When Red Dawn breaks just right, it sure is nice! A 3-second dip of this bowl resulted in a deep red that broke clear in the thin spots,



enhancing the split rim, curves, and swirling in the middle of the piece.

Three colors and two glazes on this textured mug! The bottom 2/3 of the piece was dipped in Rhodes Matte. The inside and top 2/3 were dipped in



Jeff's Long Beach
Blue. The latter glaze was applied a bit
thinly, which I think resulted in a greener
color with some brown highlights instead
of its more typical blue. The overlap of the
glazes turned a nice sky blue.

This vase was an exercise in tape resist, design, and glaze application. I liked the curves of the piece, so I decided to accentuate them with vertical lines of tape and then added diagonal lines to keep things interesting. The shape of this piece



made the use of glazing tongs impossible, so I inflated a balloon inside the piece and used it as a handle of sorts. I then dipped the piece in Blue Crystal and painstakingly removed the tape.

A snowflake piece glazed in Chun White over Black by Popular Demand which resulted in a beautiful blue. The snowflake design came from a stencil



which I placed on the bisqued piece and taped down to get it nice and flush with the surface of the plate. I then dipped a stiff-bristled toothbrush in Black by Popular Demand and used it to "spray" the glaze over the stencil. Then I removed the stencil from the piece and dipped the whole thing in Chun White. Voila!

A mug with Blue Satin
Matte on the body and
Magic Mushroom on the
inside and rim. The little bit
of overlap between the
glazes resulted in a nice
color gradient.

How long have you been working in clay? Where?

Clay is a material that I like to get my hands in, however, to be creative with clay you need a space where you can make a mess and some available equipment such as a kiln, slab roller, wheel etc.

A few years ago, I moved to Salem and discovered Willamette Art Center when I accompanied my grandchildren to Family Clay Sunday. This is a place with that space and equipment. I enrolled in my first hand building class, Spring 2024. This Winter I returned to WAC for a paper clay hand building class.

What do you enjoy most?

I find joy in the entire creative process. The energy that comes from it, the whole spirit, mind, body connection. I delight in turning a lump of earth into creative animal or figurative sculptural pieces. Mostly I do not consciously think about it, I relax, take pleasure in this sweet state of contentment where nothing else matters. The pieces I create have meaning to me, mostly from my love of the natural world.

What do you find most challenging?

My head is full of ideas. When I think about what I am doing too much or want to work towards a desired design requiring certain construction skills that I have not yet figured out, it is hard.

What did you like best about your class?

Our instructor, Doug Dacar, pushes the boundaries with paper clay. It was exhilarating to be around that energy, creativity and passion and trying techniques I never thought possible with clay. My absolute favorite activity was the raku firing. To actively take my pieces that next step: to place them into the fiery furnace, pull them out all glowing, place them in a combustible combination, then witness the enchanting transformation, was just awesome, full of excitement and magic. Amazing!

Congratulations to those that won the Empty Bowls raffle items. Thank you to those who donated their items for the raffle.

Empty Bowls has become an integral part of the WAC culture. While we're sad that we won't be hosting this fundraiser in 2025, it will be back.

The Board of Directors made the decision to suspend this event for one year in part because it takes a full year to make all the pieces and plan the event. With the move to a new location, the loss of a month or more to make the items, would have a negative impact. The Marion Polk Food Share is in full support of the decision and is rooting us on.

Since the start, WAC has donated more than \$304,000 to MPFS. The check for 2024 was \$17,492.94 representing half of the net proceeds.

Margrethe and Greg Gregg are hard-working volunteer monitors on Monday evenings and favorite instructors. While Margrethe answers patrons' questions, Greg produces bag after bag of recycled clay. It's a messy process to take the red cart of waste clay, add re-hydrated chunks of dried-out

clay, and load the scraps into the pugmill in the right proportions to yield a blend with the proper moisture. Each batch includes a scoop of





fine-grained ball clay to ensure good plasticity, so the reclaimed clay is as workable as new. This clay is available for patrons and is also used for Family Clay. Thank you, Margrethe and Greg!

Jim Ransom used Jeff's Blue over Mushroom to make this lovely translucent teal. The stripes were made by applying tape before the first dip in Mushroom. The tape is removed for the second dip in Jeff's Blue.

REMINDERS

Don't Recycle Clay without Checkina

Carefully sift through your water buckets and trays for tools, leather, plastic, and other non-recyclable bits and bobs before dumping them into the bins.

Only recycle clay that fires to Cone 10. All clay purchased at the WAC qualifies. But if you're using clay purchased elsewhere, be sure it is appropriate for recycling.

Mark Your Pots

It is really important to mark the bottom of your pot to be fired with your name or special mark. Always write your name on the back of the firing tickets. Also add the special mark if you use one.
